



WHAT'S NEW TODAY

Governor Cuomo Press Briefing

• The curve continues on a downward trajectory and the numbers are down for the tenth straight day. The amount of net hospitalizations and number of intubations continues to decrease, but there are still new COVID hospitalizations every day (1,359 yesterday). For the last few days, the number of new hospitalizations has remained flat around 1,350 cases per day.






• There were a total of 438 COVID-19-related deaths on April 22th. Of this 403 were hospital deaths, and 35 were in nursing homes. This represents a slight decrease from the previous day – but for the last several days the number was generally flat. A total of 15,740 New Yorkers have passed away from coronavirus.



- The Governor said that protecting nursing homes is currently the State's number one priority. The State Department of Health (DOH) and the Attorney General's Office will investigate nursing homes to ensure that all regulations and laws are being followed to protect residents and workers.
- The State will direct nursing homes to immediately report to DOH actions they have taken to comply with all DOH and CDC directives. If nursing homes are unable to provide adequate care for residents, they must transfer the resident to another facility.



- The State is engaging in both diagnostic testing and antibody testing. Diagnostic testing is being used to find positive cases, trace their contacts, and isolate those with exposure. Antibody testing is being used to find individuals who have contracted the virus and recovered in order to find blood plasma donors and to inform the State's reopening strategy.
- The State has completed a statewide antibody testing study in which a random sample of 3,000 New Yorkers were tested for antibodies in 19 counties and 40 localities. Of the individuals tested 13.9% had COVID-19 antibodies, which means they had the virus at one point but have recovered or were asymptomatic.

• If the infection rate is 13.9%, the death rate may be lower than some estimates. If these results can be extrapolated to the State's total population that would mean 2.7 million people have been infected. With 15,500 deaths in the state that would be a death rate of 0.5%. This is only preliminary data and may not be a perfect representation of either data set.



- The results of the antibody study support the Governor's regional reopening strategy because areas with high infection rates can travel if you open areas with low infection rates.
- The Governor addressed comments from U.S. Senate Leader Mitch McConnell saying that States should declare bankruptcy rather than receive federal funding. State and Local Governments fund police, fire, teachers, and healthcare workers. These workers deserve Federal relief in the same way that small businesses and airlines do. Senator McConnell also referred to funding to State Governments as "blue state bailouts." Governor Cuomo urged Federal Representatives to set aside politics during this time and address the needs of the nation.
- In response to a question from a reporter, Secretary to the Governor Melissa DeRosa said that the State has paid out \$2.2 billion in unemployment so far, which is more than any other state. New York has paid benefits to 1.1 million people and an additional 207,000 people will be added today.
